

Prince Rupert Woman Killed as Truck Goes Off Road in Interior

Another death marked week-end accidents on the Skeena River Highway. Mrs. Emilie Catherine, 66, Prince Rupert cannery worker, was killed Saturday night when a coal-laden truck she was a passenger dropped 80 feet off the highway on the other side of Cedarvale opposite the Skeena River.

The truck was a 50 or 60 foot long trailer. It had landed on its side after turning over. Apparently, it was in soft gumbo at the time of the accident. The driver, Gerald Robertson, was killed. 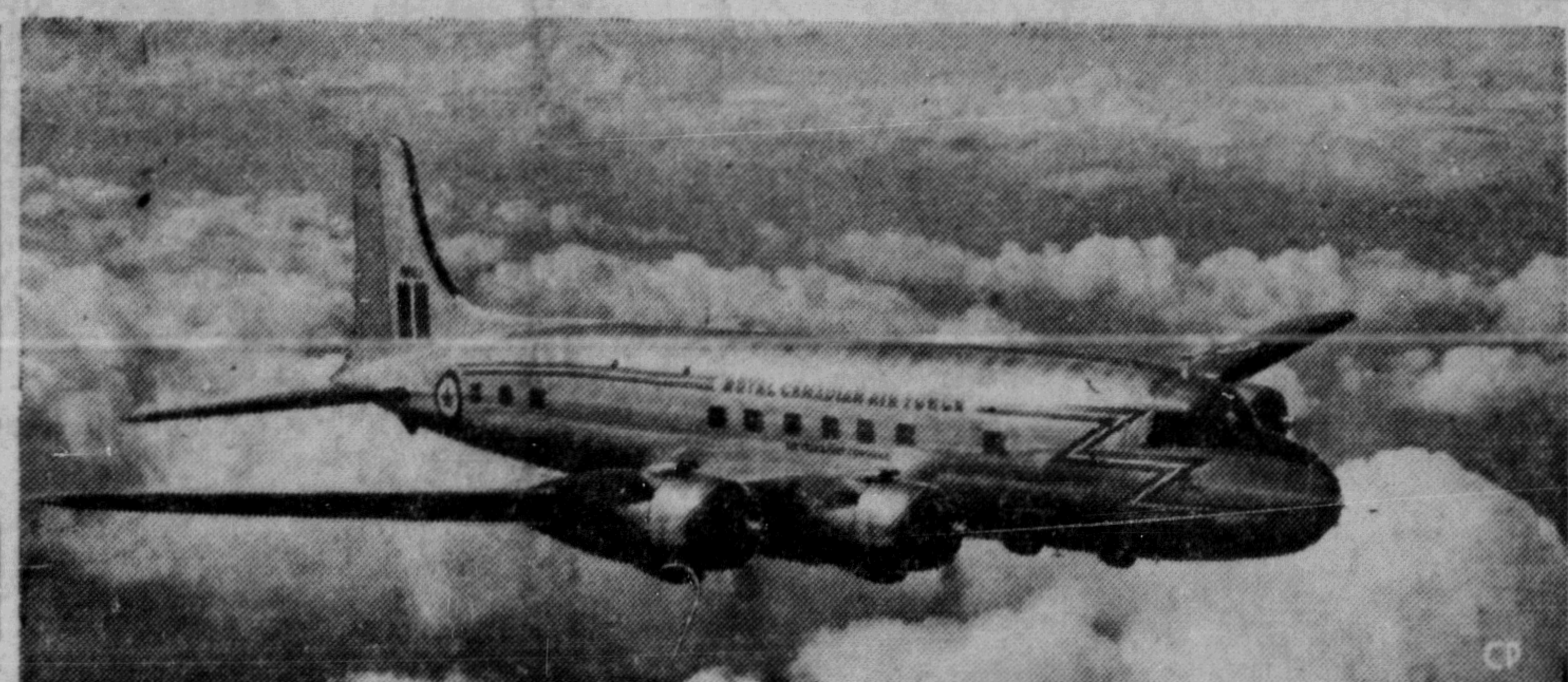
Mr. Perry's "Tremendous" Vote in Esquimalt

UN Can Win War

Bradley Confident of Korea Outcome—Sees Truce Still Possible

TOKYO (CP)—United Nations has enough power in Korea "to keep anyone from running over us," General Omar Bradley said today after a flying visit to the front. "I do not think the Communists can hurt us," Bradley said. The general did not rule out the possibility that disrupted truce talks might be resumed in Kaesong. "It all depends on circumstances," he said. "We have suggested a place with equal rights. So far we have had no reply." Bradley said that, if truce conferences collapse completely, United Nations forces are capable of fighting the Korean war to a successful military conclusion.

Coalition Candidate Poor Third in Fight

VICTORIA (CP)—Frank Mitchell, curly-haired 26-year-old former champion Army boxer, yesterday punched out a victory for the CCF over British Columbia's coalition government in the Esquimalt provincial by-election.

Mitchell, who won the Army's light-heavyweight boxing title during the war, defeated Mayor Percy George of Victoria, the coalition candidate, and three independents to win the seat which was made vacant by the death of Cdr. C. T. Beard, Coalitionist.

Musial Wins Fifth Crown

NEW YORK (CP)—Although official averages have not been released, Stan Musial, 30-year-old St. Louis Cardinals slugger, has won his fifth National League batting crown. Musial finished the regular season Sunday with a .355 average. Play-off games between Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants count in the averages but no one can catch Stan. Jackie Robinson of the Dodgers is close in third place, with a .335 mark after Sunday's game but he cannot pick up 20 points. Richie Ashburn of the Philadelphia Phillies is second with .344. Only two other players, Honus Wagner and Rogers Hornsby, have won more National League batting titles than Musial. Wagner won eight crowns and Hornsby seven.

Women Pass up London Jobs

LONDON (CP)—More and more of Britain's 13-a-week women office workers are staying close to home. Instead of flocking to take jobs in the City and West End they prefer to work in factories, small offices and shops near their homes. "The situation is noticeably worse than last year," said Mrs. Rosalind Pyke, who runs an employment agency in London's Bermondsey district. "The City and West End have only 10 per cent of the juniors they need, compared with 20 per cent last year." Reasons given for this migration of youngsters to jobs in the provinces are increased fares, discomfort of rush-hour travel and the high cost of restaurant meals. At a starting salary of £3, £3 15s. if they can type, the girls find it cheaper to work where they can cycle to and from work and go home for lunch.

Vacation Hazards Hit Manitoba MP

LONDON (CP)—G. P. Renouf of Minotons, Man., a member of the Manitoba Legislature, will long remember his 1951 holiday in Europe. Enroute from Britain to Jersey, in the Channel Islands, a trunk containing most of Renouf's clothing went astray. He then applied for some funds which he had invested in bonds in Jersey. But the British Treasury declined: visitors from the dollar area are expected to use dollars for spending in Britain. So Renouf had to call on Canadian officials in London, including the branch office of a Canadian bank, before he could get money to replenish his wardrobe.

Jim Hearn's Pitching is Win Factor

BROOKLYN (CP)—Jim Hearn, big side-arming right-hander, pitched one of his most brilliant games Monday and turned back the fighting Brooklyn Dodgers 3 to 1 in a tense mound duel and carried the enflamed New York Giants to within a single victory of their goal—the World Series. In propelling destiny's totos to their eighth straight victory and their thirteenth decision in their last 14 games, Hearn yielded only five hits to the bone-tired Brooklyn flock and was not in serious danger of being caught, because Bobby Thomson and Monte Irvin slashed out home runs. Leo Durocher's amazing team needed to win only one of the two games scheduled on their home field starting today to clinch the greatest stretching drive in all baseball. Ralph Branca went eight innings for the Dodgers and turned in a creditable performance but Thomson's thirty-first blast of the season in the fourth inning, with Irvin on base, and Irvin's twenty-fourth leading off in the eighth unhorsed right-handed fastballer. Bud Podbielniak worked in the ninth. Andy Pafko gave the flock its only score when he caught Ahearn's fast ball and shot it into the shallow left field stands with two down in the second.

Peron Blames Ambassador

Declares United States Envoy Back of Revolt in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (CP)—President Peron charged today that Spruille Braden, former United States ambassador, was originator of Friday's unsuccessful revolt in which hundreds of soldiers and politicians were arrested.

Sources close to the Army said that 200 officers and men had been seized in a relentless police dragnet during the week-end.

Many leaders in the opposition radical, nationalist, communist, socialist and conservative parties were listed by political circles as in custody.

At a press conference Peron revived his long standing feud with Braden, ambassador here for four months in 1945 and assistant secretary of state for Latin-American affairs until 1947.

In New York, Braden said that Peron's charges were "perfectly ridiculous" and showed "how weak and wobbly he (Peron) really is."
