Alaska Road May Pass Up Kitwancool Valley After Leaving Present Road

HIGHWAY

It is understood here that the route of the Alaska Highway, after it leaves the Prince Rupert-Prince George Highway, will be from Kitwanga up the Kitwancool Valley until it strikes the Cranberry River, a tributary of the Naas River, a few miles above Meziaden Lake. Already the road is completed from Hazelton to Kitwanga, about 25 miles and up the Kitwancool Valley about 30 miles to Kitwancool Lake. From there to the Naas River will be 50 miles over an easy grade.

All the possible routes have now been examined and this is the favorite and doubtless will be the one finally chosen. Colonel Rolston and W. K. Gwyer flew over this route a few days ago and it is understood were very favorably impressed with its possibilities.

The Kitwancool Valley was formerly known as the valley of the Bad Indians from which white men were excluded.
