BOSTON, Aug. 9:-The days when a lobster fisherman could be 6.00 identified by his habit of standing 7.50 in his dory and pushing on the oars. progressing along the sea something like an inchworm, are gone forever. Lobster fishing, like other inustries, has felt the pressure of modernism and the putt-putt of the power boat is only one item in the

The modern lobsterman is likely to have a 28-foot power boat, with a specially rigged clutch on the engine that can be thrown out leaving the motor running and the propeller idling. In a boat like this there is a davit set on the starboard rail with a snatch block on it. This is luxury, for, by its aid th lobsterman picks up his buoy, pas es the slack of the line over the snatch block and leads it to a Saturday, August 9, 1939 drum on the engine, All he has to do then is to take a turn on the drum, tighten it, and the engine will fetch his gear to the surface-if the
