NEW HALL
IS OPENED

Bishop G. A. Rix Led an Impressive
Dedication Service Last Evening
of Fine Building

Voluntary Labor

Enjoyable Program Marked Inaugural
Ceremonies Last Night of
St. Paul's Adjunct

With some 150 persons in attendance, the dedication and official opening of the splendid new parish hall in connection with St. Peter's (Seal Cove) Anglican Church took place last evening. The main building measures 60 by 30 by 14 feet and on one end there is a well-fitted kitchen. The structure was put up entirely by volunteer labor and is a credit to the church as well as to the community.

The dedication service was very impressive. After the singing of the National Anthem, Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, the rector, led the congregation in prayer and J. E. Boddie, vicar's warden and chairman of the building committee, read an address, after which, on behalf of the incumbent, the wardens and people of the church he presented the keys of the hall to the diocese which was represented by Bishop G. A. Rix.

The Bishop then dedicated the hall to the service of the church and handed the keys back to Mr. Boddie to be kept in trust for the diocese. In conclusion of the dedication ceremonies, the hymn, "All People That on Earth Do Dwell" was sung. The musical program which followed was most enjoyable. There were vocal solos by Mrs. J. H. McLeod, Mrs. C. E. Cullin and Mrs. F. W. Allen; vocal duets by Rev. Alfred Wilson and H. Lincoln; recitations by Mrs. W. Armstrong, and violin solos by Miss Nellie Lawrence, accompanied by her sister, Miss Molly Lawrence.

Interspersed with the musical program were appropriate speeches by Bishop Rix, Mayor C. H. Orme, Canon Rushbrook, Dean Gibson and the chairman, Robert Blance.

Bishop Rix congratulated the congregation of St. Peter's on having such a splendid leader as Canon Rushbrook. He hoped the hall would be primarily used for the religious and social education of the children.

Canon Rushbrook, after thanking all those who had labored so tirelessly in connection with the construction of the hall, made presentations, on behalf of the congregation, to G. A. Kelsey and A. D. Birrell. Mr. Kelsey, the canon said, had not only supervised the building of the hall but had put in many hours of work himself. Mr. Birrell had been an able right-hand man to Mr. Kelsey.

100 at Sunday School
It was intimated during the proceedings that the Sunday School attendance had now passed the 100 mark. The new hall is to be used primarily for Sunday School work. A collection was taken up during the evening, the sum of \$59.10 being realized.

At the conclusion of the evening's proceedings delicious refreshments were served by a committee of ladies consisting of Mrs. C. J. Norrington, Mrs. A. H. Hill-Tout, Mrs. S. E. Sunbury, Mrs. W. Skinner and Mrs. W. Dalzell.

Dancing was then enjoyed until midnight. Among those who contributed to the success of the evening were the artists on the program, Mrs. James Black and David Eastman, who provided music gratis for the dancing.

C. J. Norrington was general convener for the evening's proceedings. J. E. Boddie was master of ceremonies for the dance. W. O. Viger and W. Skinner acted as ushers. Accompanists were Mrs. C. E. Cullin, Mrs. A. H. Kielback and Mrs. C. J. Norrington. Mrs. Robert Blance and Mrs. George Kelsey were among those who gave assistance generally.
