Agreeable Personality

In his days of prominence Augustine Birrell was easily one of the most agreeable personalities of the House of Commons. Not merely did Derailment Un he make a distinguished figure through his gifts as a front bench man but also by reason of his qualities as a platform speaker and for the delight which he gave to thousands of readers through his essays and other writings.

Birrell was the son of a distinguished Liverpool Baptist minister and was born in 1850. Birrell's reputation as an essayist opened with the publication of the first of his series of "Obiter Dicta" in 1884. In his wit there was pungency in plenty but never malice. Birrell's last literary work of importance was published in 1928. when he edited "Home Letters of the Earl of Beaconsfield."

Birrell's first wife died in 1879 In 1888 he married the daughter of Frederick Locker, the poet, widow of the Hon. Lionel Tennyson. Mrs. Birrell died in 1915.
