Plan of Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture, Seen As Solution For Plight of 40000 Families Suffering Fourth Straight Crop Failure

TORONTO, Aug. 23: (CP)—Hon. Robert Weir, minister of agriculture, announces, according to the Toronto Mail and Empire, an agreement with the provinces and railways whereby settlers and livestock will be transported at reduced rates from drought-stricken southern areas of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta to the north. The movement holds out some hope for the solution of the problem of forty thousand families facing their fourth successive year of crop failure. It is estimated that half a million livestock will be moved. Under the terms of the agreement the railways will transport the cattle to feeding grounds in the north at forty percent of the normal freight rates, and settlers and effects at sixty-six and two-thirds percent. Feed fodder will be carried to the drought areas for cattle owned by families remaining there at sixty-six and two-thirds percent. The federal government splits the transportation costs with the provincial governments on a fifty-fifty basis.

OBJECT TO LAND TAX

Sabotage is Resorted to by Farmers Of Irish Free State

LIMERICK, Irish Free State, Aug. 23.—Farmers of Limerick and Waterford have registered their objections to the annuity land tax sales by felling trees over roads, cutting lines of communication and ripping up railway tracks.

CONFERENCE NEAR CLOSE

Wheat Pact Nations Give Approval To General Proposals at London Parley

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The international wheat conference was prepared to wind up its work yesterday by giving final approval to a series of general proposals for submission to the governments adhering to the 1934 wheat pact.

Ottawa Advancing Million Dollars to This Province For Public Works Program

VICTORIA, Aug. 23: (CP)—The federal government will advance \$1,000,000 to British Columbia for public works, Premier T. D. Pattullo announced this afternoon. So far as direct relief is concerned, the Premier stated no agreement had as yet been concluded on the question of monthly contributions, the matter being left in abeyance until returns are completed as of August 31.

New Wheat Evolved At Vanderhoof

For fourteen years the farmers of the interior of British Columbia have been asking for an experimental farm but so far have failed to secure anything. The result has been, according to George Ogston of Vanderhoof, that they have been doing a lot of experimental work for themselves. One farmer, Haakon Stangebye of the Vanderhoof district, has for four years been working on the development of a new wheat suitable for the district. Some of the wheat was shown by Mr. Ogston at the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia this week and elicited much favorable comment. It is a 92-day wheat and the originator feels sure he has a wheat that will give increased yield. It has not yet been named.

The offences are non-extraditable.

Twelfth Plane Here and Will Make Trip South With Squadron

Expedition Now Under Twenty-Four Hours' Notice to Depart But May Not Get Away Until Saturday, Regularly Scheduled Date

Lieut. G. L. Huff's flying boat, which made a forced landing on account of engine trouble near Coronation Island, Alaska, on Tuesday afternoon while coming here from Sitka with the United States Navy squadron of twelve planes, arrived in Prince Rupert at 7:30 last evening on the deck of the aircraft tender Swan and had completed repairs this afternoon and made test flights. The machine will be ready to join the squadron when it hops off from here at the end of the week for Vancouver enroute back to San Diego.

TENSION IS INCREASING

Menace of Second Russo-Japanese War Appears to be Intensified

TOKYO, Aug. 23:—Menace of a second Russo-Japanese War appears to be intensified as a result of increasing tension between both nations over recurrent incidents along the Manchukuo - Siberian border.

The three surface craft and 12 aircraft are today under orders to be in readiness to leave within twenty-four hours although the original plan was that they would remain here until Saturday.

Jews to Continue German Boycott

Until Their Full Rights as Citizens Have Been Restored, Geneva Conference Decides

GENEVA, Aug. 23:—Delegates to the World Jewish Conference have issued a communique declaring themselves in favor of continuing the anti-German boycott until Jews have been reinstated with full rights as German citizens.
