WHEAT SITUATION

According to Donald Marvin, economist for the Royal Bank, the carry-over of wheat from this season to the next will be particularly small in Canada, possibly not more than thirty million bushels and the world's reserve is small. This means that the coming crop will be in demand. The total world carry-over at the end of this wheat year is estimated at 615,000,000 bushels, slightly higher than last year but much lower than the average.

Rumania, normally a large exporter, may not have more than enough for her own use this year. Northern Africa has a reduction of approximately a million acres this year in wheat but Europe has an increase of 700,000 acres. The Argentine crop suffered from late frosts and drought and was reduced to 184,000,000 bushels as compared with 249,000,000 bushels the previous year. The Australian crop was large, amounting to 180,000,000 bushels, the average being 158,000,000. The United States had so good a crop last year that the country is able to export over one hundred million bushels.

Conditions in Italy have been extremely unfavorable for a large crop. The winter crop suffered and spring conditions have not been good.

In Canada the prospects are excellent. There is plenty of moisture so far and, even without later rains there is bound to be a crop. If it should be well marketed there should be a great pick-up in general conditions. If there is a good crop there will be plenty for poultry and stock even if wheat prices are a little lower. A heavy crop on the prairies means demand for elevator accommodation and Prince Rupert elevator may be used for shipping part of the export crop.

GRANT FOR TURGEON HIGHWAY

Despatches from Ottawa indicate that another grant will be made this year for the extension of the highway north from Vanderhoof towards Finley Forks. This will be a mining road but eventually will become an outlet from the Peace River Block. It will serve a dozen or more mines in the Omineca country and possibly may serve as the first step toward developing the large coal deposit at Finley Forks.

NORTH AND SOUTH

PILE UP HOME RUNS

Trosky's and Leiber's Circuit Clouts
Help League Leaders to Win

PITTSBURG, May 7: (CP)—Hal Trosky of the Cleveland Indians and Hank Leiber of the New York Giants made their fifth home runs of the season yesterday. The Indians retained their leadership of the American League by defeating the Philadelphia Athletics, their margin being increased to a game and a half over the idle New York Yankees. The Giants lead in the National League stayed at two and a half games as they defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates while the second place Chicago Cubs were making another flourishing finish to beat the Boston Bees in a slugfest.

The Boston Red Sox took exclusive possession of the fourth place in the American League by defeating St. Louis Browns, the Chicago White Sox dropped into fifth place by losing to the Washington Senators in thirteen innings.

St. Louis Cardinals, by winning over the Phillies yesterday, moved into sixth place in the National League ahead of the Brooklyn Dodgers who lost to Cincinnati Reds.

The novelty dance held by the Serenaders' Orchestra in the Oddfellows' Hall was a very successful affair, about 175 persons being present. Henry Montesano was master of ceremonies and dancing was in progress from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. Hats balloons and serpentine enlivened the proceedings.

G. W. Nickerson said the C. P. R. boats were the worst offenders. They did not give the passengers time to see the city and possibly spend an odd dollar here. While the C. N. R. had longer stops in the city than at Alaska ports, the C. P. R. has much shorter stops. In view of the fact that the company received a subsidy from the Dominion government he thought it should consider favorably the Canadian ports. He suggested the committee go after the C. P. R. in this respect. He moved that the report of the committee be accepted and that it take up with both companies the matter of providing summer reservations for Prince Rupert people wishing to go south during the tourist season.

Longer Stop-overs

S. E. Parker said complaints had been made by B. Hougan of Francois Lake that the stop in the city was too brief on the special excursions. Three days was not long enough to give the visitors a chance to do their business. In reply to this, Mr. Lakin said these excursions were always for three days. It was a general rule of the company everywhere. On motion of Mr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Minns, it was decided to ask that the time be extended.

The Skeena River Fishermen's Association wrote asking the support of the Chamber to secure for them the right to licence boat-pullers during the gillnetting season. This had been customary in the past but this year had been eliminated. This was referred to the fisheries committee for report.

A reply from Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, minister of education in regard to an application for increase in allowance for payment of teachers in outlying districts was referred to the Graham Island Farmers Institute for further advice.

It was reported that the Chamber of Commerce had written to Olof Hanson M. P. in regard to a proposal to have airplanes manufactured at the local dry dock yards. This was approved.

An invitation to the Chamber to send a representative to the Port Day celebrations at Vancouver was accepted and the president will arrange for a local representative to be present on that occasion.

A request to support the petition of the people of Queen Charlotte Islands for an increase in the steamship subsidy with a view to getting a better service was referred to the transportation committee for report. It was pointed out that the subsidy had been gradually reduced.

In reply to a request from the Kamloops Board of Trade for support of British immigration, it will be pointed out that the Chamber had several times gone on record as supporting this.

Line of Vessels Calling at Prince Rupert Looked Upon as Most Important

In view of the possibility of the local elevator being abandoned by the Alberta Wheat Pool at the end of this season, the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce last night decided to again urge the Ottawa government to grant a subsidy to a line of steamships to call at Prince Rupert. G. W. Nickerson said that a number of vessels were subsidized to call at Vancouver and, if no extra subsidy was granted for Prince Rupert, the C. P. R. and other vessels should call at Prince Rupert. There was nothing so important for this port as this subsidy. It was understood that the sum of \$60,000 was included in the budget but that as a result of the effort to balance the budget it had been struck out.

Bar Silver


