## Sweden Surveys Its New Genius

Much Of Its Trade Cut Off Nation  
Takes Stock Of Inventions

STOCKHOLM, July 30: (CP)—  
Present conditions with many of  
the most important trade routes  
cut off has caused the Swedish  
government to institute recently  
another state organization—"The  
Board of Inventions." The aim will  
be to exploit to an increasing ex-  
tent one of the Swedes' most valu-  
able resources, their "inventive  
genius," whereby it is hoped to  
bring out valuable contributions  
for the solution of many current  
crisis problems.

The chairman of the Institution,  
Helge Ericson of the Swedish Tele-  
graph Office, explained some of its  
functions. The board is established  
to promote and utilize inventions  
and technical ideas which, in so  
far as they can be realized with  
necessary despatch and at reason-  
able cost, are of value for the na-  
tional economy and the defence  
of the country.

In the first place the board has  
to give consideration to the utili-  
zation of Swedish raw materials  
in any of the plans submitted  
and in that way bring out substi-  
tutes for commodities which are  
difficult to obtain from abroad.

The Board is composed of three  
members, appointed by the gov-  
ernment, but will have the power  
to call on outside collaborators  
and advisors for assistance in  
judging specific cases. All docu-  
ments relating to inventions will  
be kept secret and matters will  
be dealt with in the simplest and  
most expeditious manner.

## OFF FOR BAHAMAS

Coming Of Windsors Stimulates  
American Interest And Recalls  
Other Days

LONDON, July 30:—One re-  
port yesterday said that the  
Duke and Duchess of Windsor  
would sail this Thursday aboard  
an American liner from Lisbon  
for the Bahamas where the  
Duke has been appointed Gov-  
ernor General. Another report  
said they would spend a few  
days in London before crossing  
the Atlantic.

NEW YORK, July 30: (AP)—The  
fond hopes of Gotham hostesses  
once more are directed toward the  
Duke and Duchess of Windsor. As-  
pirations to entertain the famous  
pair alternately blossom and wilt  
as the theme song shifts from  
"Now they're coming" to "Now  
they aren't."

The harder hostesses, thwarted  
in 1937 when the Windsors can-  
celled their scheduled American  
tour, are playing a patient, waiting  
game. If the new govern-  
ment of the Bahamas, and his  
American-born wife for whom he  
gave up Britain's throne, don't  
come to the United States pretty  
soon, the would-be hostesses will  
play Mahomet and go to the Ba-  
hamas.

Many, however, are frankly dis-  
couraged, and have ceased figu-  
ratively scanning the eastern hori-  
zon with the expectation of seeing  
the star couple in the romance of  
the century swoop down soon in a  
clipper plane.

A number of invitations were  
dispatched to the couple at Lisbon,  
attempting to persuade them to  
pause here on their way to the  
Duke's new post. One was from a  
valiant patron of a benefit for  
refugee children. He wired invit-  
ing the Duke and Duchess to at-  
tend the show, and said, "Your  
presence may solve entirely the  
child refugee problem here."

### Former Partners Married

Few of the invitations came  
from the Long Island gold coast  
families with whom the Duke  
dined when he was last here in  
1924 as a gay young bachelor and  
Prince of Wales.

The reason was that time and  
the tide of events—which changed  
David Windsor's prospects in those  
16 years from King-Emperor over  
one-fourth of the earth's inhabit-  
ants to governor-general of a  
small chain of islands—also  
wrought many changes in the  
households he visited. The pretty  
girls who danced with the young  
prince in 1924 are married and  
some have children in high school.

Alice Winthrop, the young  
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry  
Rogers Winthrop, who were his  
official hosts during that three-  
week visit, is now Mrs. Robert G.  
Payne.

Diana Guest, to whom he gave  
his finest polo pony before he left  
for Canada, has been married  
twice since then. Her father, Fred-  
erick E. Guest, who was one of  
the Prince's hosts, has died. So  
has Will Rogers, whose wit de-  
lighted the Prince, and who  
turned out in a blue serge suit to  
occupy a place of honor at the  
Prince's request at an ultra-smart  
stag dinner at Long Island's Pip-  
ing Rock Club.

C. H. MacKay, communications  
magnate who played squash rac-  
quets with the Prince, and gave  
a great ball in his honor at "Har-  
bor Hill," his Long Island show  
place, has died. The great house,  
a copy of a French Chateau, sur-  
rounded by rose gardens—the  
house that glowed that night with  
flowers and lights, and with the  
MacKay gold dinner service—is  
now unoccupied and for sale.

Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., on  
whom the Prince called at her  
Sagamore Hill home, still is active.  
She's coming from Connecticut  
next week to celebrate her 79th  
birthday August 6 at the same  
house.

But in general the scene has  
changed in that 16-year lapse of  
time in the course of which Ed-  
ward Windsor ascended—and re-  
nounced—a great throne.
