WAKING FROM SLEEP

"The most encouraging thing I see on the world horizon on the first day of the second year of the present war is that the British people are waking up as after a long sleep," says Elmore Philpott.

"Not since 1909 or 1910 has the social conscience of the British public been as obviously active as it is right

now. "Perhaps the war had to force the dispersal of thousands of slum children throughout England's green and pleasant land to make the comfortable classes see for themselves the human results of living in appalling poverty. Perhaps the legions of the new destroyer had to be encamped just a few miles away, across a narrow strip of water, to make Britons begin to take stock of the land! in which they lived. Perhaps among all of the hundreds! of lies broadcast by the Goebbel's lie factory this truth has; been flung to the world-that what is going on today is not just another war but another phase of a war revolution. At any rate, British newspapers have begun to talk about political and social conditions in terms which would have been inconceivable a few months ago."

SECOND WAR LOAN

The easiest and most comfortable way of helping the war is for those who can afford it to buy war loan bonds. They are the safest investment Canada has and at the same time they provide the sinews of war in order that final victory may be achieved.

To those who have money in the bank or in easily convertible investments we suggest that at least a part of it may be invested in these bonds. If Germany should win because Canada did not do her duty, none of the investments of people here would have much value. The best, way just now to protect our democracy is to buy war bonds so that the Canadian forces may be sustained in the field.

DOMINION OF CANADA SECOND WAR LOAN

The Bank of Canada is authorized by the Minister of Finance to announce the offering of a loan to be issued for cash in the following terms:

3 Per Cent Bonds due October 1, 1952

Callable on or after October 1, 1949

Issue Price: 98.75% and accrued interest Yielding 3.125% to maturity

Denominations of Bearer Bonds: \$100, \$500, \$1.000

The proceeds will be used by the Government to finance expenditures for war purposes.

Payment is to be made in full against delivery of interim certificates on or after October 1, 1940.

Principal and interest will be payable in lawful money of Canada. Interest will be payable without charge semi-annually at any branch in Canada of any chartered bank. The Bonds will be dated October 1, 1940.

In accordance with the announcement made by the Minister of Finance on August 18, 1940, the Bank of Canada has been further authorized to announce that applications will be received to convert Dominion of Canada 41% Bonds due September 1, 1940, which have not yet been presented for payment, into an equal par value of additional bonds of the above issue. The 41% Bonds accepted for conversion (with final coupon detached) will be valued at 100.25% and the resultant cash adjustment in favour of the applicant will be made at the time of delivery of the new Bonds, on or after October 1, 1940.

Cash subscriptions and conversion applications may be made through any approved investment dealer or stock broker or through any branch in Canada of any chartered bank, from whom copies of the official prospectus containing complete details of the issue may be obtained.

The Minister of Finance reserves the right to allot cash subscriptions in full or in part.

The lists for cash subscriptions and conversion applications will open at the Bank of Canada, Ottawa, at 9 a.m., E.D.T., on Monday, September 9, 1940, and may be closed at any time at the discretion of the Minister of Finance, with or without notice.
