WAKING FROM SLEEP

"The most encouraging thing I see on the world horizon on the first day of the second year of the present war is that the British people are waking up as after a long sleep," says Elmore Philpott.

"Not since 1909 or 1910 has the social conscience of the British public been as obviously active as it is right now.

"Perhaps the war had to force the dispersal of thousands of slum children throughout England's green and pleasant land to make the comfortable classes see for themselves the human results of living in appalling poverty. Perhaps the legions of the new destroyer had to be encamped just a few miles away, across a narrow strip of water, to make Britons begin to take stock of the land in which they lived. Perhaps among all of the hundreds of lies broadcast by the Goebbels' lie factory this truth has been flung to the world—that what is going on today is not just another war but another phase of a war revolution. At any rate, British newspapers have begun to talk about political and social conditions in terms which would have been inconceivable a few months ago."

SECOND WAR LOAN

The easiest and most comfortable way of helping the war is for those who can afford it to buy war loan bonds. They are the safest investment Canada has and at the same time they provide the sinews of war in order that final victory may be achieved.
