## ICELAND IN DANGER

The Parliament of Iceland last Friday dissolved the union with Denmark which has existed since 1918 when Iceland became a sovereign state after having been a Danish protectorate. The Danish King, as a result, is no longer King of Iceland. The move is made, it is explained, because of communication difficulties and not because Iceland is no longer loyal to King Christian.
