## Landing Field Search...

Evidently the search for a landing field at or near Prince Rupert is still being carried on and it is possible that before very long a satisfactory solution of this problem may have been reached. The matter of cost has been a factor in the search for a location. According to the latest demands the field should be at least four miles from any mountain so that the danger from blind flying may be eliminated. In and around Prince Rupert it is difficult to get that far from a mountain and yet get a level surface. The Digby Island proposal seems to have been turned down as not feasible.

The combination of rock and muskeg is said to be the most difficult kind of construction and would prove very costly. By using a location where runways might be constructed by hydraulic dredging would cheapen the operation and make it possible to construct an airfield for very little over a million dollars, whereas the cost of a field with suitable runways a mile in length would cost a great deal more than that. The new airfield at Washington, D.C., was constructed by means of hydraulic dredging and so was the one at Treasure Island, San Francisco. A site here at Garden Island could be levelled without great difficulty by using a dredge and there are other sites in the neighborhood that might to a large extent fill the requirements, giving runways a mile long in three directions and yet be quite clear of the mountains. The new requirements for blind flying and high speed make necessary keeping away from mountains, and long runways and the high speed planes make long runways desirable.

#### A Valuable Asset . . .

After the public meeting addressed by Premier Pattullo Saturday night a remark was made by one of those present something like this: "What a mistake it would be for the people of Prince Rupert to turn down a candidate who has such a wide knowledge of provincial and national affairs, yes, and of Prince Rupert affairs and to choose to represent them a novice who would be of little value for several years at any rate. 
