LONDON, Aug. 19 (P)-American warships, making their first attack on the Italian mainland, shelled bridges and power installations at Giola Tauro and Palmi on the Gulf of Gioio. Allied air fleets described beating Axis troops of resistance by pounding communications throughout southern Italy.

The Germans are moving troops into Italy in considerable strength, apparently intending to make a real fight for at least the northern end of the country, competent British sources said today.

LONDON, Aug. 19 (P)—Russian troops, striking across the Donets River Wednesday, captured Zmyev, 20 miles south of Kharkov, in an assault which killed 1,200 Germans and threatened to cut one of the last railways feeding that besieged and nearly surrounded Ukrainian base. Russians northwest and west of Kharkov captured more than 50 villages.
