# REGISTRATION DISPOSAL IS

OTTAWA-Decision has not yet been taken on what disposal will be made of the Nationa Registration records, following termination of the registration some weeks ago, according to a statement issued today by Arthur MacNamara, deputy minister of

"I have noticed a statement being made in one or two quarters that a decision had been made to microfilm all the records and preserve the films," Mr. MacNamara said. The records consist mainly of over 9,000,000 cards in 12-inch by 10-inch size, which, it will be recalled, were the cards on which the registration was originally made in 1940, according to Mr. MacNamara.






