Bulgaria Quitting

Appeals to Moscow for Armistice After Reds Declare War

LONDON, Sept. 6 (CP) -Bulgaria appealed hastily to Moscow for an armistice totoday only a few hours after receiving a declaration of war from Russia. Bulgaria bolstered up the plea by declaring that the government had ordered strong measures against the Germans whom she accused of attacking Bulgarian army units. There was no immediate reaction from Moscow. It was last night that Moscow radio announced that Russia had declared war on Bulgaria.

Later the Nazi-controlled Oslo radio said that the Russians had begun a march into Bulgaria.

Of all Hitler's one-time Balkan allies only Hungary still appears to be still within his grasp.

The Berlin radio said today that bitter fighting was raging between Hungarian and Rumanian troops inside the Hungarian border.
