Besides expected underground factories, disarmament units discovered factories inside the dignified interiors of town halls and other municipal buildings. In Detmold they discovered essential waterworks parts missing and found the parts distributed

The Nazis dismantled parts of airplanes, machinery and even one of their pocket battleships and hid them over wide areas. The trained staffs of the disarmament branch are confident they can unearth them all—but it
