A Timely Revival

//THE FAMILY that prays together, stays together." Essentially the movement has for its purpose the strengthening of the foundations of good family life. Although initiated by the Roman Catholic Church, the appeal of the campaign has equal validity for all, irrespective of creed.

POLIO PRECAUTIONS

V/HETHER OR NOT this is an epidemic year | Minister: Rev. G. E. Sendail. W for poliomelitis, there are certain precautions that health authorities say should be taken during this season when epidemics may occur. These are largely common-sense health precautions which it does no harm to follow at any time.

1. Avoid crowds and new contacts if possible. Avoid crowded places where you may be close to another's breath or cough. The exact method by which poliomyelitis is spread is not completely known but the virus is present in discharges from the nose and mouth of a person who has the disease. Only a small proportion of the people who have policimyelitis become paralyzed, and many cases of the disease are never recognized. It has been estimated that about 7 of 100 persons are cases or carriers during the late summer and fall, and all these seven may spread the disease.

2. Avoid over-fatigue. Too active play, late hours, worry, irregular living schedules may invite a more serious form of the disease. It is believed that over-fatigue and too strenuous exercise may precipitate a paralytic form of the disease in a person who has a previously unrecognized infection.

3. Avoid chilling. Take off wet clothes and shoes at once. Keep dry shoes, sweaters, blankets, and coats handy for sudden weather changes. Sudden chilling of the body, as may occur in a plunge into cold water on a hot day, may lead to a serious form of the disease.

. Postpone nose and throat operations during a poliomyelitis outbreak. Although statistics thus far do not substantiate the theory many doctors believe that a severe form of poliomyelitis frequently follows operations on the nose and throat.

5. Keep clean. Wash hands after going to toilet and before eating. Keep food covered from flies and other insects. Burn or bury garbage not tightly covered. Avoid using another's pencil, handkerchief, utensil or food touched by soiled hands. Since the virus has been found in nose, mouth and bowel discharge and on flies, general hygiene measures are necessary in this as in other diseases.

Parents are also warned to be alert to early signs of illness or changes in the normal state of health. A physician should be called at once if there are symptoms of headache, nausea upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, or unexplained fever. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment are important:




