Enrolment Is Higher

School Population Still Growing—School Board Meets

Enrolment in Prince Rupert schools during the month of January was substantially higher than a year ago but attendance average was lower due to the cold weather and illness such as chicken pox, mumps and colds. This was revealed at a meeting of the School Board Wednesday night.

Enrolment at Booth totalled 452, while at King Edward, which has been closed since January 24, 308 pupils were in attendance. Conrad Street school showed enrolment figures at 250. At the Borden Street school, 245 pupils were in classes. Total enrolment this January was 1255 compared with 1168 in January 1949.

Conrad Street 89.3
Borden Street 87.5
