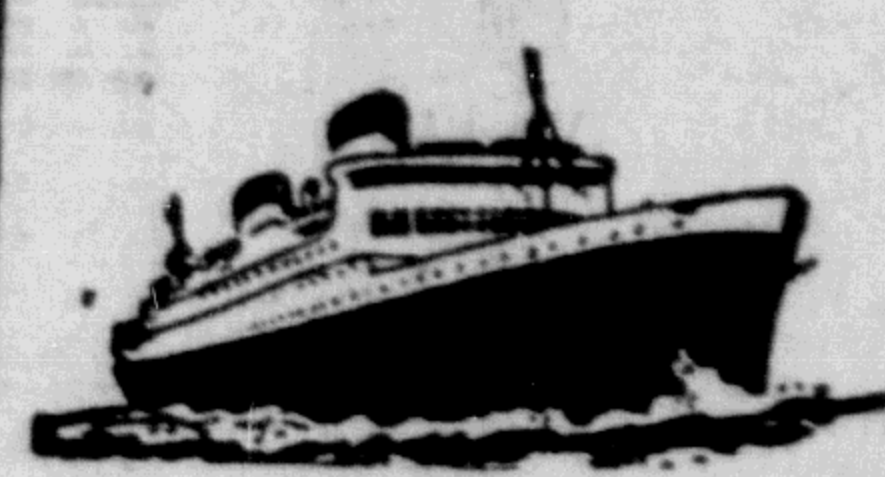

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

Two Union Steamships flagships in Port—Fines at Queen Charlotte for Illegal Fishing

Two of Union Steamships flagships were in port last evening as they will be each Sunday night for some time from now on. Steamer Coquitlam, Capt. Alf Aspinall, arrived at 4 o'clock yesterday morning from Massett Inlet points and sailed at 11 p.m. for Butedale, Namu and Vancouver. The Camosun, Capt. John Boden, arrived at 6:30 last evening from Vancouver and way-points and also sailed at 11 p.m. for Port Simpson and Allice Arm whence she is due back here tomorrow morning to sail at 1:30 p.m. on her return south.

Frank Waterhouse freighter Chilliwack, Capt. H. S. Stephens, arrived in port at 9 o'clock Saturday morning from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and, after discharging and loading cargo here, sailed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon for the Naas River and Alaska. Chilliwack's cargo for Prince Rupert included a printing press which is to be used by Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative for labelling at its Westview plant.

Alaska motorship Sydney is arriving in port today with canned salmon from the Ketchikan area. The Sydney is expected to make three trips here this

week from Ketchikan with similar cargo.

It is somewhat slack along the waterfront just now, with the summer traffic and deep sea and salmon fishing over, and herring activities still to come. So for some weeks, anyway, business may be expected to slacken off.

At Queen Charlotte City recently, Captain V. Jones of the seiner Grayfish was fined \$600 and costs or two months. Fish, to the number of 493 were confiscated, there having been found that number of salmon unlawfully in possession. On a similar charge, Captain F. Polard of the seiner Husky was fined \$400 and costs or two months, with 477 salmon confiscated.

During September British Columbia shipped 70,661,000 board feet of timber, according to the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau's report. This total far surpassed the combined shipments from Washington and Oregon, it being 22,871,000, even before the maritime strike began to take effect in the American ports.

CHANCES FOR TELEPHONE LOAN APPEAR GOOD

Prince Rupert's chances of obtaining provincial government permission to float a self-liquidating loan to rehabilitate its telephone system are "very favorable" according to City Clerk H. D. Thain who returned on Saturday with Alderman T. B. Black from a conference with the Minister of Municipalities, R. C. McDonald.

Mayor Nora Arnold, who flew south with Mr. Black and Mr. Thain on Wednesday returned last night on the Camosun.

The delegation met Mr. McDonald and B. C. Bracewell, his deputy minister, in Vancouver on Thursday, presenting the city's case to them.

While they received no definite answer, they were of the opinion that the city's proposal to float a \$500,000 loan to rebuild the telephone system would be given sympathetic consideration by the provincial government.

Under provincial law, the government must approve municipal loans.

PRINCE RUPERT YEARS AGO

November 1, 1923

Two small sawmills along the Skeena began sending lumber to Prince Rupert for export to Japan. The lumber was to be shipped by the McMillan Export Co. aboard Canadian Government Merchant Marine freighters.

The Prince Rupert Taxpayers' Association sent a letter to city council objecting to the practice of selling city-owned lots for less than their assessed value and of selling tax-sale lots for less than the taxes owed.

Unfavorable weather which prevailed during October caused halibut landings for the month to drop sharply. Only 1,844,100 pounds were brought here as compared with 2,164,000 pounds in the previous October.

November 1, 1913

Prospectors returning from the Sibola placer field near Telkwa reported disappointing results from their work and exploration.

Petitions were in circulation in the city asking for water, electric and telephone extensions to outlying sections of the city and also an auxiliary lighting plant for municipal buildings and recreation grounds.

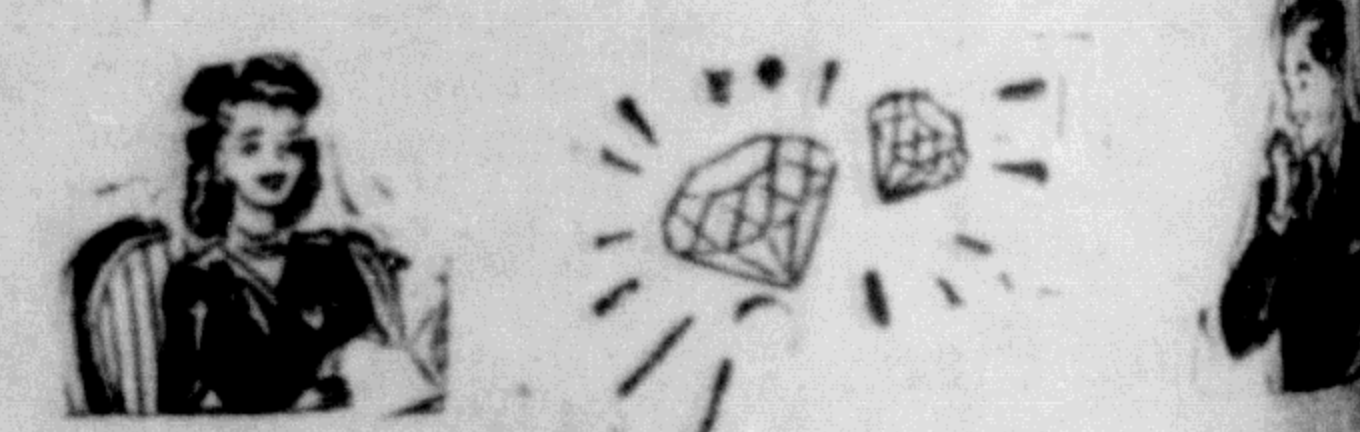
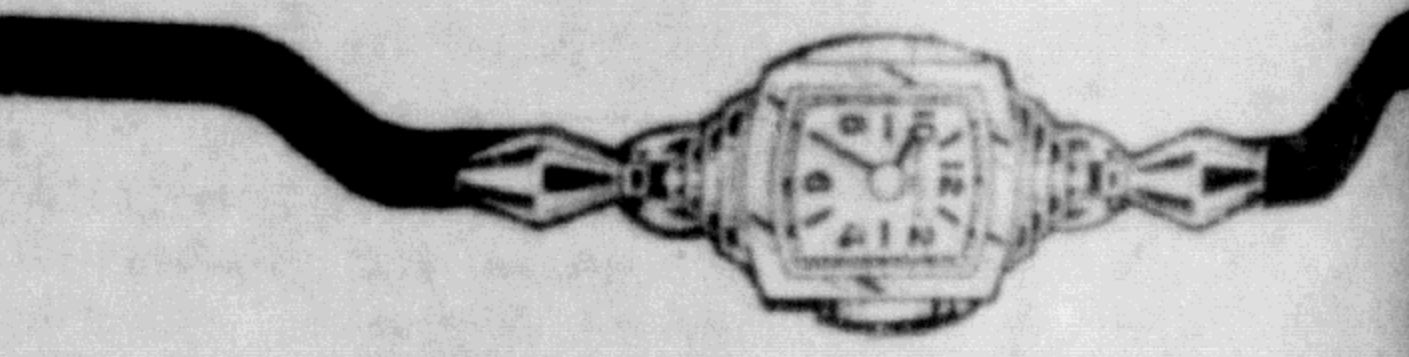
