STANDARDS FOR PRESS

the royal commission on the press including the suggestion for the voluntarily-established council to supervise the fourth estate.

Rt. Hon. Herbert Morrison, deputy prime minister, dropped the hint that the government might take some action, if the press itself failed to set up such a council.

Beverly Baxter, Canadian-born Conservative member and himself a journalist, charged that the commission's investigation was "a political move to disparage and muzzle the press."

The press itself does not take kindly to the House of Commons decision to set up a press council to control its standards.

The Daily Express accuses the government of "trying to throw a cloak of genial respectability over the murky origins of this attack on traditional British liberties."

The Conservative Daily Telegraph said that a government-nominated press council, equipped with the suggested powers, might easily lead to that state of control of press which the commission's report repudiated.

The Conservative Yorkshire Post said that a press council would be "superfluous" and said that such a council might "too easily become the nerve centre through which different interests would try to supply pressure on newspapers."

The Manchester Guardian took a favorable view to the proposal of a voluntarily-established council.

July 29, 1939

to route grain shipments through Prince Rupert. Air Marshal W. A. Bishop, ace of the first World War, was flying westward to inspect sites for air bases around Prince Rupert, the Queen Charlottes and Vancouver and Victoria.

A lawn bowling team consisting of Jack Preece, Angus Macdonald, Jack Frew, Louis Arrol and D. A. Macphie returned from a bowling tournament at Vancouver where they made a good showing.
