

TRAPS FOR CATCHING UNWELCOME ALIENS- Dangerous alien is the Japanese beetle, which has invaded southern Ontario from the U.S.. It's a bronze colored, spotted insect, originally from Japan, which, like the grasshopper, eats anything green. The Dominion department of agriculture, has set out 600 traps around Mimico, Ont., and will keep the invasion under control. Here Ross Biggar, Mimico student, hired by the department, prepares traps for snaring the insects. When a large number of insects is reported in any one area, poison is spread in liberal quantities.
